2	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Good morning, and
3	welcome to the Mississippi Board of Nursing.
4	Before we begin today, I would like to ask
5	Ms. Lacey Gentry to lead us in prayer.
6	(Invocation)
7	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Good morning.
8	Before we begin today, I want to start off
9	with, we have a new Board member joining us,
10	and that is Ms. Janel Moody.
11	So before we begin, I would like to start
12	by swearing Ms. Janel Moody in.
13	(Janel Moody, RN, Sworn In
14	as Member of the Board of Nursing)
15	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: At this time, I
16	would like to make a declaration of quorum,
17	and by doing so, do a roll call.
18	And I would like to begin here to my left.
19	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Jan Collins,
20	Consumer Member.
21	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: Janel Moody,
22	Registered Nurse.
23	BOARD MEMBER WALKER: Carly Walker, LPN.
24	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Dr. Melissa
25	King, Nurse Practitioner.

1	BOARD MEMBER ADAMS: T.J. Adams, RN.
2	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Sandra Culpepper,
3	LPN.
4	SECRETARY CLANTON: Janie Clanton, RN.
5	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: Lacey Gentry, RN.
6	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Mary Stewart,
7	RN.

12	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: At this time,
13	everyone should have received a copy of the
14	agenda for today.
15	So if you have reviewed it, do we have a
16	motion to approve the agenda?
17	BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: I make a
18	motion.
19	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Second.
20	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All those in
21	favor?
22	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
23	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: At this time, we
24	will go into an open forum. Is there anyone
25	from the public today?

1	(No response)
2	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All right. So
3	we're going to move on to the legislative
4	update.
5	Mr. Bobinger?
6	MR. BOBINGER: Thank you, Madam
7	President. Good morning, everybody.
8	Ms. Moody, congratulations to you. Nice
9	family. I don't think they probably told you
10	this before you got appointed, but there's
11	going to be about ten hours per week of reading
12	materials that I'll be sending out. No, I'm
13	just joking with you.
14	It's good to be here today and see
15	everybody, a lot of smiling faces. I just
16	wanted as you all know, we've been in the
17	midst of an election cycle, obviously. We're
18	getting near the end of that, and most of the
19	legislative races have been decided. I mean,
20	there are some, but most of them have been
21	decided.
22	And, as you know, we're beginning a new
23	four-year term. So by the State Constitution,
24	it will be a four-month session instead of a
25	three-month session. Also, the Speaker

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1	we'll have a new Speaker because Speaker Gunn
2	decided not to run again. The presumptive
3	Speaker will be Jason White. Now, that's still
4	got to be voted on, but he's presumptive
5	Speaker. And I think he'll do an outstanding
6	job.
7	But I wanted you to know that the chairman
8	will have to be picked all over again in
9	January, in other words, the Lieutenant
10	Governor can pick move people around because
11	he's an incumbent. He's coming back. Of
12	course, Speaker White, if that's who it is
13	and I think it certainly will be he can make
14	new assignments.
15	And just for some of the Board members
16	that maybe haven't been around this as much, it
17	is so crucial as you know, Jan to that
18	individual that chairs those committees,
19	whether it's Public Health, Appropriations,
20	things that impact this Board. It's very
21	important. So we'll be watching those things
22	closely.
23	I do want you I think Ms. Phyllis sent
24	this out to you. But January 17th is our Board
25	of Nursing Capitol Day, Madam President, so I

1	encourage all of the Board members to be there.
2	We'll be in the rotunda on the first floor of
3	the State Capitol. That's kind of a
4	meet-and-greet. We have the afternoon slot
5	from like 1 to 4, 4:30, although usually it
6	winds down prior to that. And I think it
7	coincides, if I'm not mistaken, with our
8	retreat, the Board Retreat. So I think that
9	will be a good thing.
10	Real quickly, no need to belabor it, you
11	know, I know all of the stakeholders.
12	(Board Member Alton Shaw, FNP-C, Joins Meeting
13	Via Phone Conference Call)
14	DR. BURKS: Mr. Alton Shaw?
15	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Yes, I can hear you.
16	MR. BOBINGER: Alton, I'm glad you could
17	join us. We just were talking about you.
18	The first issue is Full Practice Authority
19	legislation. You-all are so familiar with
20	this. I know all of the associations and
21	advocates as well as the Board. There's been
22	some discussions going forward in the 2024
23	session. You'll hear a lot more about those as
24	we get closer into the session. There's some
25	people working hard just to make positive

1	changes, not just for nursing, but things that
2	will impact the entire healthcare system and
3	the delivery of healthcare services for
4	Mississippi. So you will certainly be hearing
5	about that.
6	Ms. Gentry, I know that you have an
7	interest in this as well as others. I think
8	you'll continue to see an effort to do
9	something with enhancing nurse educator
10	compensation, at least I certainly hope so.
11	We talk about recruiting and retention,
12	right, with the shortages of various nursing
13	professions? Well, you've got to have people,
14	as you know, to teach folks to turn out the
15	numbers that we hopefully need or to catch up.
16	So that's going to be an ongoing issue. So we
17	hope that we'll see some things there.
18	Hospitals. We've all read and seen a lot
19	of media. As you know, Governor Reeves
20	recently took some action that's going to allow
21	more monies to be pumped into, if you will, our
22	hospitals, which I think we all agree is a good
23	thing because we've had so many that have been
24	on the verge of closing. But I think you'll
25	see other legislation related to that this

 Mayor of Greenwood recently, and the Leflore County Hospital had really been under a lot of pressure. And they were feeling, at least for now, feeling better about their situation. So we hope we'll continue to see some things with that. This ties into my next mention is Medicaid expansion. Y'all know that's been a sensitive issue, I'll put it that way. But the new presumptive Speaker, Mr. Jason White, has said that he's open to discussion or putting it on the table. Now, he didn't, to be clear, say, "I'm going to run with the flag charging," but I think the fact that he's willing to say, "I want it discussed," or, "on the table," will make it interesting. So we'll see how that plays out. There will probably be some other bills. You know, you see every year income tax credits and things to try to incentivize, again, recruitment, retention of healthcare professionals, particularly, in our case, nursing professionals. 	1	coming session. 3	indigent, which many times is the case, the
4	counties have to bear the cost of that. And a
5	lot of times with private facilities, they're
6	almost prohibited by cost.
7	So the State at least it's been brought
8	up and discussed somewhat about regional mental
9	beds for acute care cases. So I hope we see
10	something on that.
11	The last thing I'll say is, y'all know
12	Shan Montgomery does an outstanding job with
13	our budgets and working the budgets. We call
14	her a "magician," but she does a really good
15	job. And we'll be having our subcommittee
16	hearings during the session with the Senate and
17	the House on what our needs are; and,
18	hopefully, we'll be fully funded and receive
19	the requests that we ask for.
20	Any questions?
21	(No response)
22	MR. BOBINGER: If not, I will cede my
23	time. Thank you very much.
24	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Thank you,
25	Mr. Bobinger.

1	At this time, we will move on to the
2	Office of Nursing Workforce report.
3	ONW DIRECTOR TERRY: Good morning.
4	BOARD PANEL: Good morning.
5	ONW DIRECTOR TERRY: The ONW Committee,
6	we had the pleasure of meeting twice since
7	our last Board meeting. We met September 8th
8	as well as this morning. September 8th was
9	actually our first official Board meeting
10	Committee meeting. I'm sorry.
11	Our Chairperson, Ms. Janie Clanton, she
12	was able to give her vision, to which there was
13	no objection. She's going to see, for ONW, our
14	ability to increase the number of nurses at the
15	bedside, and that's RNs and LPNs. We're
16	looking to retain the current nursing workforce
17	and also recruit the upcoming generation into
18	the workforce. And so, with this vision, it
19	allowed us to segue into a conversation of the
20	ONW Scholarship.
21	At the last Board meeting, it was motioned
22	and approved for \$842,100 to be dispersed among
23	the 24 schools of nursing. With the current
24	structure, we disperse the funds to the
25	schools, and the funds are based on the amount

1	of disciplines each school has. And the
2	schools are allowed to give those or award
3	those funds to students the best way they see
4	fit.
5	Of course, there have been questions
б	regarding the reach of the funds; who is
7	receiving the funds; these students that
8	receive the funds, are they actually staying in
9	the state and working as a nurse in the state
10	of Mississippi?
11	And so, discussions came about on how can
12	we restructure this scholarship? How can we
13	ensure that the students that receive the
14	scholarship, that they are staying in the state
15	of Mississippi and contributing to our nursing
16	workforce? How can we make sure that nurse
17	educators we know that's a big thing. How
18	can we ensure that we are assisting them with
19	increasing them in the classroom?
20	So what we decided and that
21	conversation continued today is that for now
22	we would look at restructuring the scholarship
23	for fiscal year '25. And I believe Ms. Clanton
24	will bring a motion that for now the current
25	structure of the ONW Scholarship will stay in

1	place for fiscal year '24. However, we will
2	notify the schools with a letter of intent to
3	let them know that there will be restructuring
4	of the ONW Scholarship beginning next fiscal
5	year.
6	We wanted to do our due diligence to the
7	schools to notify them in enough time. We know
8	that the schools expect these funds every year,
9	and we wanted to make sure that we let them
10	know that starting next year, there would be a
11	restructure.
12	With the restructure, we will be looking
13	at, of course, a service obligation. Students
14	that receive these funds, how long will we
15	obligate them to work in the state? We'll be
16	looking at the amount of scholarship funds we
17	give. We want to make a big impact on these
18	students, so we want to look at the amount we
19	give and how long we would like them to work in
20	the state.
21	So we'll be doing data research to support
22	what we want to do. There's actual
23	conversation as well about requesting an
24	increase in the amount of funds that ONW

1	be able to give a large amount of scholarships
2	to students, then we'll be actually looking to
3	request additional ONW funds. So that is what
4	we came up with as far as the scholarships.
5	And then, lastly, we talked about
6	projects. Our current only project is
7	Placement Pro. If guys are not familiar, the
8	schools use Placement Pro to place students in
9	clinical settings. It has become increasingly
10	difficult because of COVID and everything to
11	place students in different clinical settings.
12	And so, that program is used to assist the
13	schools to place their students.
14	And then, we also talked about additional
15	projects, possible public safety collaboration.
16	We know violence in hospitals and facilities
17	have increased, so we'll be possibly looking at
18	that and also a collaboration with MNVP to talk
19	about diversions. And we know the effect that
20	substance abuse has on our workforce.
21	That completes my report. I'll be happy
22	to take any questions?
23	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: So whenever we
24	do the scholarships I guess I should know
25	currently, but maybe I forgot. So for

1	currently and then for 2025 for the vision,
2	does that money just go to the schools and
3	then the schools get to decide which students
4	receive the funding; and then, what is that
5	criteria that that's based on?
6	ONW DIRECTOR TERRY: So, currently, yes,
7	the schools we give that money to the
8	schools, and the schools decide who receive
9	it. Basic criteria: A resident of
10	Mississippi, in good standing with the
11	school, no prior receipt of additional
12	scholarship. But it's very basic criteria.
13	And that's another thing we'll be looking at,
14	to possibly expand or change the criteria to
15	see the reach that we'll have. But that's
16	what we're doing currently.
17	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Thank you for
18	your report.
19	ONW DIRECTOR TERRY: You're welcome.
20	SECRETARY CLANTON: And that's for 2024
21	that we're talking about. 2025 is the one
22	that we're wanting to revamp and do something
23	different. The years kind of get me off a
24	little bit. But 2024 is what we're currently
25	in.

1	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Thank you.
2	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: With that being
3	said, if there are no other questions for
4	Ms. Terry, I'm going to allow Ms. Clanton,
5	who is the Chair of ONW, to go forward with
6	hers.
7	SECRETARY CLANTON: Do you want me to do
8	the advisory also?
9	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: I think so.
10	SECRETARY CLANTON: So what I wanted to
11	reiterate was what Ms. Terry said, which is
12	that we have met twice. We've had really
13	good meetings, good feedback, and a lot of
14	ideas thrown around. And we have decided to,
15	going forward on this, since we're already in
16	this fiscal year, to leave things standing
17	and let the schools do what they've done
18	previously with the monies for 2024. And in
19	2025 is when we're going to revamp and do
20	some things look at doing some things
21	different for 2025 for the ONW.
22	So I guess what I need to do is just bring
23	a motion forward out of the ONW Committee to
24	accept what we have proposed for 2024.
25	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: With a motion on

1	the floor, do I have a second?
2	BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: I'll
3	second.
4	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All those in
5	favor?
6	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
7	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Any of those that
8	are opposed?
9	(No response)
10	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: The motion passes.
11	Thank you, Ms. Clanton.
12	Next, we're going to move on to Practical
13	Nursing Education report. Dr. Burks?
14	DR. BURKS: Madam President and Members
15	of the Board, good morning. First off, I
16	would like to share with you-all the
17	Practical Nursing Annual Report.
18	The Practical Nursing Program, they
19	participated in the National Council of State
20	Boards of Nursing Annual Report. That deadline
21	was September 30th, and all of the PN programs
22	in Mississippi participated in that.
23	They also have a Mississippi Annual Report
24	that is required of them for accreditation each
25	year. That report is due October the 15th, and

1	it provides information regarding the program
2	outcomes, such as their enrollment, completion
3	rate, their NCLEX pass rate, and employment
4	rate. And the data collected from the annual
5	report due on October the 5th, that will be
6	presented to the Board in the spring of 2024.
7	Also, there is a new program that we're in
8	the process of doing a review. That potential
9	program is Blue Cliff College in Gulfport,
10	Mississippi. They're actually in stage two of
11	their accreditation process. And their visit
12	is scheduled for October the 23rd through the
13	25th. That accreditation team consists of
14	Betty Ginn from Northwest, Dr. Melissa Bryant
15	from Pearl River, and Ms. Teresa Cole from East
16	Central. And, currently, we are working to
17	finalize their agenda and logistics for that
18	site visit.
19	The PN curriculum is also currently under

The PN curriculum is also currently under revision. The curriculum actually falls under the Community College Board. And they have a meeting scheduled for October the 11th, 2023, at 9:30, and that will be a virtual meeting. During the curriculum revision, they will look at best practices; they'll look at what's going

1	to happen in the workplace. They also need
2	their stakeholders involved, so I would
3	encourage the Board, if you have an
4	opportunity, to just log in to that meeting
5	because this is where the scope of practice for
6	practical nurses or licensed practical nurses
7	will be decided.
8	The last thing I have is regarding the
9	telemedicine grant. The grant was rewarded to
10	the Board in 2020. There was a total of
11	14 programs that participated in the grant.
12	All equipment has been received and installed
13	with the exception of three locations, and that
14	is East Mississippi Community College,
15	Itawamba, and Northeast. And, hopefully, we
16	will have their installation completed by the
17	end of the year. But some of that delay is due
18	to renovations; and so, as soon as their
19	renovations are complete, their equipment will
20	be installed.
21	We did have a training session, and it was
22	facilitated by Howard. That took place Friday,
23	September 15th, and it was a really good
24	training. And additional trainings are going
25	to be in the future, when we're going to learn

1 more about the software.

And if Madam President would allow me the opportunity, I would like to show you-all some of our equipment, Ms. Atlus. One of the things with the distance learning grant is it is providing our schools and students with the opportunity to receive equipment where they can participate in distance learning.

9 This is a telemedicine cart. And those 10 schools who opted to be a part of it, they also 11 have these telemedicine carts. The unique 12 thing about this is with the software, we can 13 communicate with the different schools.

So, for example, Mississippi College has the same setup. We can go in and log in to the system and we can actually see what's going on with Mississippi College while they're in their simulated environment.

19 If you-all will look behind you to your 20 left, that is one of the monitors, and that is 21 also part of that. The platform that's being 22 utilized for this is Lifesize. So in addition 23 to telemedicine carts, monitors, laptops, they 24 also have the platform Lifesize, where a lot of 25 the educational opportunities will take place.

1	So that's what we're in the process of
2	doing. Our plan and goal here at the Board is
3	to require videos and utilize those and place
4	them on the ONW website.
5	Some of the recommendations from the
6	schools and how they're going to utilize theirs
7	is in terms of recruitment and partnering with
8	the schools because evidence shows you know,
9	everyone knows there is a shortage. We need
10	people vested. We need individuals interested
11	in health care. So what they are going to do
12	is use their Lifesize in order to project into
13	the classrooms for middle school/high school
14	students so that those students can see in live
15	time what's going on in the classroom because
16	sometimes students enter nursing school and
17	they really don't know what it's about. So it
18	is giving them a bird's-eye view through the
19	use of technology.
20	And that is the end of my report.
21	Any questions?
22	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I love that.
23	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: And I would like
24	to say, you guys, that I attended the
25	education on this, and I'm going to say that

1	Dr. Burks and I actually played with the
2	equipment, and it is a beautiful piece of
3	equipment that is going to be essential, and
4	it is going to be amazing in the community
5	colleges and universities.
6	So, Dr. Burks, kudos to you, and thank you
7	for doing a great job on making this happen.
8	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Can I ask a
9	question, Madam Chair?
10	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Sure.
11	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: So at the
12	meeting with the Community College Board,
13	will you be presenting the curriculum?
14	I guess I'm trying to understand how
15	the Community College Board oversees the LPN
16	curriculum, correct?
17	DR. BURKS: Yes.
18	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: And then we
19	are overseeing/monitoring approvals and those
20	things?
21	DR. BURKS: Yes.
22	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: So who is it
23	at the Community College Board that is a
24	curriculum expert?
25	DR. BURKS: Dr. Cole is the curriculum

1	specialist. He is their expert.
2	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: And so, will
3	you have a part in that?
4	DR. BURKS: Yes.
5	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I'm just
6	trying to understand how
7	DR. BURKS: We work together. It's
8	multiple steps because what they do is, they
9	collaborate with us in terms of best
10	practices, and what's going on at the
11	national and state level for practical
12	nurses.
13	The NCSBN, they have a portal where
14	surveys are entered, and sometimes they'll ask
15	questions, different parts of the country,
16	about scope of practice and what can they do.
17	So that opened up the conversation.
18	The big conversation right now for
19	practical nurses is in terms of them suctioning
20	trachs. It's a gray area because they can
21	suction; but in Mississippi, they cannot deep
22	suction. So they're looking at can that be
23	added safely to their curriculum without
24	changing the number of hours because that's
25	also a caveat. When looking at the curriculum,

there's a specific number of hours. And so, 1 2 some of the stakeholders, they want to expand 3 that scope. But what we encourage them to do is utilize the LPNs to the fullest for the 4 things they can do. It's not an easy task in 5 terms of expanding or requesting to expand the 6 7 scope because then you change the number of 8 hours.

9 The programs in Mississippi are 12-month 10 programs. So if you start looking at changing 11 those hours, which is now 995 hours, that's 12 going to increase the length of their program. 13 Then you look into, do they have accessibility 14 to classroom clinicals? Because that's also a 15 component of that.

16 So that's where the Board comes in. We'll 17 be able to help guide them and direct them on 18 that standpoint.

BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: So what is your -- I'm just curious what your thinking is about how this might go? Do you have a sense, or is it just -- is it going to be like expanded IV practice or --DR. BURKS: They're not asking right now

25 anything about an IV.

1	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: No. I just
2	didn't know if this was going to be similar,
3	like this is like perhaps LPNs could do
4	additional training to be able to do deep
5	suctioning?
6	DR. BURKS: That's one of the things
7	with the additional training that they're
8	looking at that can be done within their
9	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Within the
10	existing curriculum?
11	DR. BURKS: The existing curriculum.
12	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: And then I
13	think you said the Practice Act. But, now,
14	this would just be recommendations coming out
15	of this body?
16	DR. BURKS: Correct.
17	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: And those
18	would then go
19	DR. BURKS: Here.
20	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: here?
21	DR. BURKS: Yes.
22	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: And then, to
23	change the Practice Act, that's a legislative
24	vote?
25	DR. BURKS: Because right now it is not
1	

1	listed in the Nurse Practice Act. The skills
2	and tasks are not listed.
3	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Gotcha.
4	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Dr. Burks, could
5	you repeat quickly how this will be utilized
6	in junior high and high school?
7	DR. BURKS: The equipment? Well, one of
8	the things that schools are trying to do is
9	recruit. They are trying to get students
10	interested in really the science because the
11	research shows that the interest in
12	STEM-related programs has declined in the
13	last ten years. So with that, the research
14	also shows that you cannot wait until they're
15	in high school to start getting them
16	interested. The research really recommends
17	the sixth grade that you start getting them
18	interested.
19	So what they were looking at doing is
20	it would be just like a Zoom Lifesize, pretty
21	much. You would provide them with a link; and
22	once that link is up in the classroom, the
23	program theirs will be and they can
24	actually do Lifesize through the machine. So
25	it's not like they have to go on their

1	computer. Everything can be done from that
2	machine. And once they are in there, the
3	students in the classroom can actually see
4	what's going on.
5	If you'll notice, there's actually a
6	camera on the cart. And then, on the side,
7	there is another camera because this is a
8	true this is not a model. This is a live
9	telemedicine cart.
10	There's also an opportunity for
11	example, if they wanted to get up close and
12	look at the skin, you can actually see and
13	really see into the skin. With the vital
14	signs, if they will put the just say they
15	put the cuff on, well, the numbers are going to
16	pop up on there, and the students will be able
17	to see all of that at a bird's-eye view. It's
18	very close. Because oftentimes, if you're
19	zooming into a class, it's far off. So this
20	allows them to actually be a part of it and to
21	actually see what's going on in the classroom.
22	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: When will it be
23	fully implemented?
24	DR. BURKS: Some of the schools are
25	actually utilizing it now.
I	

1	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Are we doing it
2	at Madison County Schools; and, if we are, is
3	it in the Career Technical Center, Lifesize,
4	or is it in the classrooms?
5	DR. BURKS: It's the community colleges
6	and the universities, and they reach out to
7	those particular students.
8	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay. So if we
9	wanted to do it Madison County, then we would
10	go to Holmes Community College and make sure
11	everything is happening there?
12	DR. BURKS: Yes.
13	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: How are the
14	schools finding out about this opportunity?
15	DR. BURKS: Actually, when the grant was
16	first introduced, schools, they had to buy
17	into it and they've committed. So for those
18	individuals who are a part of that grant,
19	they have the equipment already. That part
20	is already taking place.
21	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Okay.
22	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Any other
23	questions for Dr. Burks?
24	(No response)
25	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Okay. Moving on
1	

1	to the Director's report, and that's going to
2	be Dr. Burks I'm sorry.
3	I need to make a motion to accept the
4	report?
5	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I move we
6	accept the report as presented.
7	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: I second.
8	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All those in
9	favor?
10	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
11	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Any opposed?
12	(No response)
13	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: It is accepted.
14	Now, we will move on to the Director's
15	report.
16	Dr. Burks?
17	DR. BURKS: I am giving today the
18	Director's report on behalf of Dr. Johnson.
19	Mr. Bobinger shared with you-all about
20	Capitol Day, and that is January the 17th. And
21	the Board of Nursing Retreat is the
22	17th through the 18th. And more information
23	will follow regarding the location, the agenda,
24	and the specifics of that meeting.
25	Also, with Operation Nightingale, everyone

1 is aware that that is an ongoing process. So
2 new schools have been added to that. So we
3 will be looking at that information to see if
4 any of our licensees are a part of those new
5 schools once that information is presented to
6 us.

7 Also, the 2024 Federation of Association of Regulatory Boards Forum on Professional 8 9 Regulations, that is going to be January the 25th through the 27th in Fort Worth, Texas. 10 And this is a really wonderful educational 11 opportunity for individuals to network and 12 13 learn more about regulatory boards. That 14 agenda has not been presented; but as soon as that agenda is confirmed, Dr. Johnson will 15 disseminate that information to the Board. 16

Also, the Board has been visible in the community. The members of the Board of Directors as well as staff attended the National Council State Board of Nursing Annual Meeting in Chicago. It was a very informative meeting, and we received a lot of takeaways from there.

Also, the Mississippi Community College Board CTE Conference, Dr. Johnson and I, we

1	attended and we also presented during that
2	conference.
3	There's been Board visibility at the
4	Mississippi Board of Medical Licensure Retreat,
5	the MANP Conference, the INRC Conference, the
6	NCSBN Board of Directors. Dr. Cagle
7	participated in the APRN orientation or she
8	did that orientation. There's been Board
9	visibility with Wisconsin at their Board of
10	Nursing meetings, as well as with Dean of
11	Directors. And Ms. Shan Montgomery, she's
12	serving on the MEC Board of Governors.
13	So, as you can see, the Board the staff
14	has really been visible, and we will continue
15	to do our due diligence to go out of the
16	community and tell them what our vision and
17	mission is; and that is, we're a Consumer
18	Protection Agency, and our responsibility is to
19	make sure that the public is safe.
20	And that is the end of my report.

20	Title 30, Parts 2820, 2825, 2840, and 2880.
21	And those have been provided to you via
22	e-mail last week as well as in the packet
23	that was distributed earlier.

25	Board affirm the changes as approved by the

1	Administrative Code Committee.
2	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Could I interject
3	for just a second?
4	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: Yes.
5	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: On 2840, when I was
6	reading back over it and talking to some
7	people, there were a couple of things we were
8	looking to add just for clarification
9	purposes since there's also been so much
10	question about what "monitored practice" is.
11	If possible, could we table that one and
12	just talk about it one more time and come back
13	in December on that one so that we can just
14	have some clarification to it?
15	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Alton, could you
16	point out what rule that's under that you're
17	referring to for 2840?
18	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: I'm sorry. It's the
19	"monitored practice," whatever that is, 1.3.
20	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: So are you
21	asking Ms. Gentry to modify her motion of
22	approval of these with the exception of that?
23	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Well, for just that
24	section, if we could just table that and let
25	us have one more Administrative Code meeting,

1	now that I've gotten all of this feedback, to
2	actually come in there and get just a little
3	more clarification to it.
4	One of them was talking about what is
5	technically, what's a provider? And then maybe
6	adding something in there about being readily
7	available by electronic means, something to
8	that point. It's just, like I said, to get
9	clarification because there's also been so much
10	conversation on what this really means. And I
11	just want to make sure we get it right.
12	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: So I'll call on
13	Mr. Walker. He has been a phenomenal asset
14	throughout this process, as has been
15	Ms. Saltzman, helping us navigate this
16	Administrative Code process. So I will defer
17	to Mr. Walker, and then we will potentially
18	modify the motion.
19	BOARD BOARD ATTORNEY WALKER: Alton, can
20	you hear me?
21	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Yes, I can.
22	BOARD MEMBER WALKER: So if that's what
23	the Board wants to do, that's fine. That
24	section so a little background.
25	This was already submitted one time to the

1	LRC. We pulled it back because there were
2	going to be some changes made to the
3	prescription author or the Prescription
4	Prescribing Authority that's in 2840. So in
5	order to submit them all at one time, we pulled
6	back and made changes and are bringing them
7	forth now. The monitored practice hours have
8	already been approved by the full Board as they
9	are now with the changes that are in there.
10	The full Board does have the authority to
11	say, "We want to hold off." And if y'all want
12	to readdress that, you can. I just want to
13	point out that they have already been approved
14	by the Board as they are now to be submitted.
15	If we did that, we would wait until there
16	was monitored practice hours was approved
17	before we submit any of 2840 because that whole
18	process is very lengthy, and to have two
19	sections of the same part in there would be,
20	probably, a nightmare.
21	But, again, that's the Board's decision.
22	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Yeah. I just know
23	that when I circulated it among some people,
24	I started getting questions, "Well, what
25	about this? What about this?"

1	So I think we need to be a little more
2	clear on what it actually means because if just
3	the few people that I circulated it with
4	started having all of those questions, when
5	this goes out publicly, there's going to be
6	tons of them, so
7	And, really, it's no substantial change to
8	it. I mean, everything is going to stay as it
9	is. It's just a little more definition into
10	what it is and how it's done. And then another
11	question that may need clarification on is, if
12	you have more than one year, that you satisfy
13	this requirement. There was just a couple of
14	odd things there.
15	(Board Discussion Off the Record)
16	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: So, Alton, while
17	this is being discussed, the main question is
18	strictly from 2840 is strictly Rule 1.3
19	that is receiving some questions for
20	clarification?
21	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: Yeah. And, like I
22	said before, there was so much confusion
23	amongst physicians, graduates, and everybody
24	else about what it actually meant and how it
25	had to be done. Just like A(1) says,
1	

1	"Monitored practice hour means an hour
2	practiced as an APRN with a qualifying
3	provider"
4	And, you know, we took out the part about
5	"physically on premises." But, now, there are
6	going to be questions about, "What does that
7	mean? Do they have to be there? Can they be
8	by phone? Can they be by this?"
9	So I just think that would need to be put
10	in there so that it can explain what that
11	means.
12	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Understood.
13	Thank you.
14	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: And, Lacey, if
15	you'll pull up your e-mail, I sent this
16	earlier to try to get it to you prior to this
17	morning.
18	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Madam
19	President, can I get some clarity on where we
20	are in terms of, is there a motion? And
21	since this is coming from a Committee, I
22	don't know that it warrants a second, but do
23	we have a motion and a second?
24	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: We have a motion
25	from Ms. Gentry, and she can either choose to

1	move forward with that vote and we can vote
2	on it today or she can withdraw.
3	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Do we need a
4	second on this motion?
5	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Yes.

17	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Ms. Gentry?
18	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: Yes.
19	BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Yes.
20	BOARD MEMBER DR. DOTSON: Abstain.
21	BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: No.
22	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: I'll abstain.
23	BOARD MEMBER COLLINS: Madam President,
24	what was the vote?
25	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Alton, would you

1	have any vote?
2	BOARD MEMBER SHAW: No. And this is not
3	for all of it. It's just for that one part.
4	But as far as the full motion to approve all
5	of them, no.
6	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: Right. But we
7	can't move forward with all of them by
8	excluding that one, correct?
9	BOARD BOARD ATTORNEY WALKER: With the
10	current motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: With the current
12	motion, correct.
13	(Inaudible Discussion)
14	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: Right, and
15	following the lead of Legal Counsel here at
16	the Board of Nursing, so
17	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All right. Based
18	on our vote, the motion does not move forward
19	at this time. The tally for the vote was:
20	Three abstentions, four "yes," and five "nos"
21	for the record.
22	Ms. Gentry, will there be anything else
23	from your Committee?
24	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: No, not at this
25	time. Thank you, Madam Chair.

1	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Thank you.
2	Next is the Finance Committee. And
3	Mr. Cummins couldn't be here today, so I'm
4	going to read off the financial report.
5	All obligations for fiscal year 2023 had
6	to be completed by August 31st. The State
7	appropriation was augmented by 684,288 federal
8	dollars, a federal grant which allowed
9	equipment and services to be provided for
10	nursing schools throughout the state for
11	distance learning. The financial report for
12	fiscal year 2023 include the grant expenses.
13	As far as fiscal year 2023 revenue, all
14	but .07 percent of the revenue was all
15	collected online. The online system has proven
16	to be a great resource and service.
17	For fiscal year 2023 expenditures, travel
18	expenses were closer to the amount expended
19	prior to the pandemic, and all of those
20	services increased from what was expended in
21	fiscal year '22. Expenditures were just under
22	the annual average.
23	Cash balance. The ending cash balance at
24	the close of fiscal year 2023 was just over
25	7.7 million. These funds will be used for

1	FY 2024 operations.
2	For fiscal year 2024, revenue collected
3	through August was \$236,130. This is on par
4	with revenue collected at the same time in the
5	past two years and is slightly above the
6	three-year average.
7	So I'm making the motion to submit the
8	report for the Finance Committee to be adopted.
9	BOARD MEMBER GENTRY: I make a motion
10	that we adopt the report from the Finance
11	Committee.
12	BOARD MEMBER ADAMS: Second.
13	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All those in
14	favor?
15	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
16	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Any of those that
17	oppose?
18	(No response)
19	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Is there any other
20	committee business?
21	(No response)
22	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Before we end
23	today, seeing that there's no other committee
24	business, it seems that we had someone join
25	us a little bit later than planned for the

1	public to speak in open forum. So at this
2	time, I would like to give them an
3	opportunity to speak.
4	(Inaudible discussion)
5	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: We're good?
6	(No response)
7	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All right. At
8	this time, we have covered everything.
9	Do I have a motion on the table to
10	adjourn?
11	BOARD MEMBER ADAMS: I make a motion.
12	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: Second?
13	BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Second.
14	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: All those in
15	favor?
16	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
17	PRESIDENT CULPEPPER: We are now
18	adjourned.
