3	MS. CULPEPPER: Good morning.
4	Welcome to the business meeting for the
5	Mississippi Board of Nursing for July 21st,
6	2023. It is 11:11 a.m., and I would like to
7	declare that we do have a quorum.
8	And the first order here is the
9	approval of the agenda. Can I get a motion on
10	the approval of the agenda?
11	MS. NORRIS-JOHNSON: I make a motion.
12	MR. CUMMINS: I'll second.
13	MS. CULPEPPER: At this time we'll go
14	to a vote. All those that accept, please say
15	aye.
16	BOARD PANEL: Aye.
17	MS. CULPEPPER: Anyone that abstains?
18	(No verbal response.)
19	MS. CULPEPPER: We'll go to open
20	forum. Do we have anyone in regards to open
21	forum that would like to speak?
22	Let me step back for just one moment.
23	I got ahead of myself. And I would like to open
24	the business meeting with prayer.
25	Ms. Nancy Johnson, would you like to

- 1 open us with prayer?
- 2 MS. NORRIS-JOHNSON: Let's bow our
- 3 heads.
- 4 (Prayer.)
- 5 MS. CULPEPPER: All right. Now to
- 6 move on to anyone from the public that would
- 7 like to speak at this time.
- 8 (No verbal response.)
- 9 MS. CULPEPPER: Okay. And next we're
- 10 going to move on to the legislative update.
- 11 Mr. Bobinger, do you have anything?
- MR. BOBINGER: Yes, ma'am, I do.
- 13 That was quick. I was still pulling my papers
- 14 out.
- Good morning to everybody. I think I
- 16 spoke to most everybody prior to the meeting.
- 17 Dr. Johnson, I told her, I didn't know what her
- 18 title was: President, Dr. Johnson, executive
- 19 director. But in any event, it's good to be
- 20 here today and address the board.
- I just want to mention a couple of
- 22 obvious things. If you watch any local TV,
- 23 you've seen these political races are heating
- 24 up, particularly some of the statewide races.
- 25 Next week we have the Neshoba County Fair. For

- 1 those who may be interested, if you've never
- 2 been, it's an interesting experience, but you
- 3 better like sweating and red dirt. So if you
- 4 don't like those things, I wouldn't necessarily
- 5 advise going. But there will be some heated
- 6 debate under the pavilion, no pun intended, as
- 7 well as outside the pavilion.
- But we do have these races coming up.
- 9 You know, these folks that are elected,
- 10 regardless at the legislature or the state
- 11 level, obviously have a huge impact on policy
- 12 for the State of Mississippi. And that --
- 13 certainly health care is no exception to that.
- 14 It -- you know, it has a big impact. So
- obviously we'll be following those races
- 16 closely.
- We talk about our -- it's been
- 18 somewhat perineal the last few years -- full
- 19 practice authority legislation. I think,
- 20 Dr. Johnson, we can say there's been some very
- 21 preliminary discussions or talk, but nothing too
- 22 far down the road. We do want to emphasize we
- 23 want all stakeholders involved in every
- 24 classification that may be impacted to have a
- 25 seat at the table discussing a bill for next

- 1 session.
- I think, you know, we want everybody
- 3 together, and I think it's been difficult to do
- 4 much until after the elections occur, you know,
- 5 so things are set.
- 6 You also, since it's the beginning of
- 7 a new term, you have new committees appointed.
- 8 I mean, it's the same committees, but you have
- 9 new members. Now, I would suspect, depending on
- 10 how the elections go, those would remain
- 11 relatively intact. If for some reason there
- were changes, then you could have some big
- 13 change-ups.
- I wanted to mention some other issues
- 15 that we may see. One -- Ms. Gentry, I know
- 16 you've had a fond spot for it. Dr. Stewart, you
- 17 will as well in your new capacity. But enhanced
- 18 nurse educator compensation, I know that's an
- 19 issue. Dr. Johnson, we've discussed -- I know
- 20 the board of nursing has been very supportive of
- 21 that. I know working with IHL, the deans and
- 22 directors, the community colleges, we all know
- 23 the challenges, Madam Chair, with recruiting and
- 24 retaining nursing -- nurses and professionals of
- 25 all categories. But you've got to have adequate

- 1 capacity to create and train those nurses in the
- 2 first place. And I think one way you do that is
- 3 be competitive in your pay for your educators.
- 4 So that's something that I think we can see and
- 5 the board certainly has supported.
- 6 You could see a possible bill dealing
- 7 with the makeup of the board. You remember last
- 8 year you guys got an early draft of a bill. It
- 9 was actually the full practice authority bill.
- 10 There was some language inserted that would
- 11 tweak the current composition of the board.
- 12 That didn't really get any traction last year.
- 13 Don't know that it will this year. But it's
- 14 something we'll just keep an eye on and be
- 15 looking at to, you know, make sure that it's
- 16 something this board, our director and staff,
- 17 everybody is comfortable with it if there is
- 18 legislation proposed.
- 19 Hospitals. Our favorite topic,
- 20 right? It just seems like we continue to see
- 21 articles about layoffs and cuts, and not just
- 22 from one area of the state, but from the north
- 23 to the south. I mean, it seems -- and kind of
- 24 east to west. So the legislature did do two
- 25 things. You remember they passed the bill that

- 1 would allow consolidation, mergers, make it
- 2 easier, also collaboration agreements. That's
- 3 just something to try to make it a little easier
- 4 to help support particularly some of the smaller
- 5 rural hospitals, but it could apply to anyone.
- 6 That passed. And also the legislature
- 7 appropriated just over \$100 million to go out
- 8 statewide. Which that's a lot of money, but
- 9 then again, when you have to divide it among all
- 10 the hospitals, it goes pretty fast. But I think
- 11 that was an effort, to the legislature's credit,
- 12 of trying to, you know, at least hold things
- 13 together until this next session. That's why I
- 14 bring it up.
- I think we're going to see a lot more
- 16 discussion about our hospitals and our health
- 17 care system, how we're going to fund those for
- 18 the long term, what's going to need to be done
- 19 to sustain the system. So I think -- and that
- 20 can lead into discussions whether you're for or
- 21 against about Medicaid expansion or some form of
- 22 that, some way to provide funding longer term
- 23 where we don't lose anymore hospitals. Of
- 24 course, you've also got the big concern -- not
- 25 just with the general services of the hospital,

- 1 but the acute care, the emergency aspect of it
- 2 as well.
- The other thing I wanted to mention,
- 4 I think we'll hear more about some bills to --
- 5 for recruitment and retention of nursing
- 6 professionals. You know, Dr. Johnson, Chairman
- 7 Mims reached out to us prior to last session
- 8 about income tax credits. That's an example or
- 9 doing things to try and help retain, as well as
- 10 recruit, new nursing professionals. I assume
- 11 we'll see several bills of that nature.
- The last thing I'll mention is in the
- 13 mental health area, there's been more talk about
- 14 possibly, and I'll put quotations around that,
- 15 trying to do something more with acute care beds
- 16 that could be geographically spread across the
- 17 state for these involuntary commitments in
- 18 emergency situations. I think it was St.
- 19 Dominic just closed their mental health
- 20 services. So you get into a situation where you
- 21 have some of those folks being put in jail
- 22 because there's nowhere -- and I think we all
- 23 agree sick people don't need to be in jail, nor
- 24 do the law enforcement officials want them in
- 25 their jails.

So hopefully -- and there was a bill 1 2 passed this last session that I think got a good start, but there's more to be done. And I think 3 you'll hear about that as well coming out of the 4 public health committees and possibly some other 5 committees in the '24 session. 6 7 Anybody got any questions? If not, I'll conclude. Thank you very much. 8 9 Thank you. MS. CULPEPPER: 10 DR. KING: Ms. Sandra, Madam Chair, 11 can I ask Mr. Bobinger a question? 12 MS. CULPEPPER: Yes. 13 DR. KING: Hey, Trey. From the 14 Senate bill that passed for the collaboration and of the hospitals with the appropriated 103 15 million, that is still being -- like, they're 16 going to have to take that back up in the 17 session to see how to appropriate it because of 18 19 some of the red tape and parameters that were around that; is that correct? So that money has 20 21 not yet been able to have the definitions behind 22 it to allocate it to specific facilities across 23 the state. MR. BOBINGER: Ms. King, I will have 24 25 to check that. I don't know if it will require

- 1 legislation or will it be through the Department
- 2 of Health, the promulgation of some additional
- 3 rules and regulations. Do you follow me? As to
- 4 how they want to -- you remember in the bill,
- 5 they made a big distinction about hospitals that
- 6 had less than 100 beds, and those that had in
- 7 excess of 100 beds. And also remember it also
- 8 factored in: Did you provide acute care and
- 9 emergency services, like ER services.
- 10 So there was kind of a basic
- 11 formulary for doing that. But I'll be glad to
- 12 check into that and let you know. There very
- 13 well may be -- they may need to tweak something
- or it may be an administrative issue where they
- 15 have to promulgate some more rules and regs on
- 16 how the money would be, you know, appropriated
- 17 out to the different hospitals.
- DR. KING: Okay. All right. Well,
- 19 great. Thank you for checking into that for us.
- 20 MR. BOBINGER: Thank you very much.
- MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 22 Mr. Bobinger.
- MR. BOBINGER: Thank you.
- 24 MS. CULPEPPER: Next we have -- I
- 25 would like to welcome Dr. Renia Dotson, our

- 1 newest appointment, to the board of nursing.
- 2 And at this time I would like for Dr. Dotson to
- 3 join me up here so that I can swear you in.
- 4 (Dr. Dotson sworn in.)
- 5 MS. CULPEPPER: And while I'm up
- 6 here, I want to go ahead and follow up with --
- 7 we have received some certificates from the
- 8 governor's office for our reappointments and
- 9 confirmations that we would like to present. If
- 10 you could, come up, Ms. Carly Walker.
- 11 Next, Ms. Janie Clanton.
- DR. JOHNSON: And next we have board
- 13 president -- Madam President Sandra S.
- 14 Culpepper, "All to whom these presents shall
- 15 come" -- reading -- "In the name of the State of
- 16 Mississippi, I, Tate Reeves, acting under the
- 17 authority vested in the Governor by the
- 18 Constitution and laws of the State of
- 19 Mississippi, do hereby appoint Sandra S.
- 20 Culpepper to the Mississippi Board of Nursing to
- 21 hold office until removed or replaced in
- 22 accordance with the laws of the State.
- Given under my hand." And signed by
- 24 the Honorable Tate Reeves and the Honorable
- 25 Michael Watson, Secretary of State.

- 1 MS. CULPEPPER: And the last one is
- 2 Mr. T. J. Adams has been reappointed and
- 3 confirmed. He is not available today, but we
- 4 will make sure to get this to him as soon as
- 5 possible.
- 6 All right. Next order of business,
- 7 we have the Office of Nursing Workforce Report,
- 8 and I believe Dr. Johnson --
- 9 DR. JOHNSON: I'm deferring to the
- 10 new chair of the Office of Nursing Workforce,
- 11 our board member, Ms. Janie Clanton.
- 12 MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 13 Dr. Johnson.
- MS. CLANTON: Okay. Coming from the
- 15 Office of Nursing Workforce, we aim to
- 16 distribute approximately \$842,100 in scholarship
- 17 funds to support the development and retention
- 18 of a diverse nursing workforce, enhance nurse
- 19 mentorship, increase the presence of the APRNs
- 20 in rural areas, expand the number of nurse
- 21 educators at the community college level and the
- 22 baccalaureate level.
- 23 The criteria for our scholarship
- 24 that's in the updates is the retention --
- 25 workforce retention. We want to partner with

- 1 schools that will be required to disburse the
- 2 funds and awards within the following ranges per
- 3 fiscal year. The undergraduate students, it's
- 4 anywhere from a minimum of \$1,000 to \$5,000 for
- 5 the awardee. The advanced degrees, which is the
- 6 master's, the doctorate, and the Ph.D., is going
- 7 to be up to \$7,000 per fiscal year.
- 8 With -- upon receipt of these
- 9 scholarships, they are going to have to sign a
- 10 retention clause, and the proposed retention
- 11 clause will be time -- we'll figure that out in
- 12 time to come.
- 13 Some more of the ideas that we had is
- 14 the APRN placement in rural areas. So according
- 15 to that, we want to increase the APRNs in rural
- 16 areas, and this is aiming to drive healthcare
- 17 needs in some of the underserved communities by
- 18 providing financial support and incentives to
- 19 those APRNs to pursue careers in that rural
- 20 setting.
- 21 Again, diversity in nursing: We want
- 22 to encourage applicants to the board from all
- 23 under-represented groups.
- 24 And then the nurse educator
- 25 development, we want to enhance the ability of

- 1 qualified nurse educators. And a portion of
- 2 this scholarship could be allotted to supporting
- 3 individuals pursuing a career in nursing
- 4 education at the community college and at the
- 5 baccalaureate level. We aim to address the
- 6 shortage of nurse educators and enhance the
- 7 pipeline of future nursing facilities.
- 8 By expanding the scholarship criteria
- 9 to include some of these versatile components,
- 10 the ONW scholarship program will have a broader
- impact on workforce development, mentorship,
- 12 diversity, and education in the nursing field.
- So my motion today is to approve the
- 14 \$842,100 in the scholarship funds for the
- 15 nursing workforce.
- 16 MS. CULPEPPER: Do I have a second on
- 17 that?
- MR. CUMMINS: Second.
- MS. CULPEPPER: Is there any
- 20 discussion?
- DR. STEWART: Madam Chair, just as a
- 22 matter of comment, some of you are probably
- 23 aware, but -- and I'm speaking about
- 24 baccalaureate and higher degree programs, but
- 25 the accrediting group for baccalaureate and

- 1 higher degree programs is shifting their
- 2 accreditation standards from degree-focused to
- 3 whether graduates are entering practice as first
- 4 entry or advanced entry.
- 5 And so I would just encourage us to
- 6 think about making sure that our language is not
- 7 limiting because within the next year, we'll no
- 8 longer have for the baccalaureate and higher
- 9 degree, DMP essentials, MSN essentials and BSN
- 10 essentials. There will only be entry to
- 11 practice and there will be advanced practice.
- 12 They're moving away from the degree language.
- So -- and IHL has, as you all know,
- 14 approved the exploration of an early -- of an
- 15 entry level master's level program for the
- 16 state, which will be the first one in the state,
- 17 but it is not something that's new to the
- 18 country. They've been going on for about
- 19 20 years. So just as we're doing this, I just
- 20 want us to be aware of some of the language
- 21 because I heard the degrees in there, and that
- 22 may not be necessarily applicable in the near
- 23 future.
- MS. CULPEPPER: That will be noted,
- 25 Dr. Stewart. Thank you. Any other discussion?

DR. KING: Madam Chair, if I may, can 1 2 I ask Ms. Clanton a question? 3 MS. CULPEPPER: Yes. 4 DR. KING: From the -- whenever you said APRNs in rural areas, are we excluding 5 APRNs from other areas? And I don't know what 6 7 the most recent evidence-based data shows for APRNs, but it didn't seem like there was a 8 9 shortage of APRNs for rural areas. more of the physician status. But not APRNs 10 11 from those rural areas. So I'm just trying to 12 make sure we're not being exclusive of -- or 13 putting language in there that would be restrictive, I guess. 14 15 MS. CLANTON: Exactly. This is kind 16 of preliminary, and we are looking into it, but we want to drive some of the APRNs to look at 17 18 some of the areas that are lacking. Like you said, doctors are lacking nurses, and they're 19 lacking APRNs, so we want to kind of drive them 20 21 to the more that are in need at this particular 22 time. 23 DR. KING: Is there a way -- do we 24 have the data right now to show current state of 25 APRNs associated across our geography in the

- 1 state and where they're located currently to
- 2 make sure that we're just not using that term
- 3 "rural" for when we -- and it ends up being an
- 4 exclusivity-type issue?
- 5 MS. CLANTON: I don't know if the
- 6 website posts a geographical location.
- 7 DR. JOHNSON: No. These are all
- 8 suggestions that came out -- that the Office of
- 9 Nursing Workforce committee will be meeting with
- 10 the director of Office of Nursing Workforce to
- 11 work out the particulars. It was not to -- it
- 12 will not involve everybody -- and as Ms. Clanton
- was reading, it says a portion of those
- 14 scholarship funds will be dedicated. That's a
- 15 suggestion. But that is yet to be determined
- 16 how all of this is going to be disseminated or
- 17 worked out. They just wanted the board to be
- 18 aware. This is for informational purposes.
- 19 The primary objective today is to
- 20 approve the funding for the scholarship funds
- 21 that will be going out within the next couple of
- 22 months.
- But duly noted. And those are things
- 24 that the chair can take back. And I understand
- 25 you all will be meeting probably the first week

- 1 in October -- not October. August. To work out
- 2 the particulars of how this information and
- 3 agreement on some of these things that you have
- 4 suggested would be carried forward. So any
- 5 input from any of the board members are indeed
- 6 welcome, but that's something that the ONW
- 7 committee, which consists of our board members,
- 8 will be meeting with the office -- or the
- 9 director of Nursing Workforce and then coming
- 10 back for further dissemination of information in
- 11 the next board meeting.
- DR. STEWART: Madam Chair, so for
- 13 clarification, the motion is that we approve the
- 14 amount?
- 15 MS. CLANTON: The motion is just for
- 16 the amount of \$842,100 for the Office of Nursing
- 17 Workforce. The four things that I had listed
- 18 was just some ideas that were thrown about.
- MS. STEWART: Thank you.
- 20 MS. CULPEPPER: Any further
- 21 discussion?
- 22 (No verbal response.)
- MS. CULPEPPER: Okay. I'm going to
- 24 ask for a vote. All of those that accept, say
- 25 aye.

1 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 2 MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 3 (No verbal response.) 4 MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? (No verbal response.) 5 6 MS. CULPEPPER: All right. We're 7 going to move on to the Practical Nursing 8 Education report. 9 DR. JOHNSON: Madam President, did the board members that are on the Zoom vote? I 10 11 did not hear an aye or --12 MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you, 13 Dr. Johnson. So, Dr. King, did you vote to 14 accept this? 15 DR. KING: Yes, I did. 16 MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you. So at 17 this point we will move on to the Practical 18 Nursing Education report. 19 DR. KING: I think you have T. J. and Alton on virtual as well. 20 21 MS. CULPEPPER: Okay. I'm sorry. 22 just saw them. So T. J. 23 MR. ADAMS: Yes. 24 MS. CULPEPPER: Do you want to 25 confirm that you accept that vote?

MR. ADAMS: Yes, I vote to approve. 1 2 MS. CULPEPPER: Alton Shaw. 3 Do you accept that vote? Shaw. 4 (No verbal response.) MS. CULPEPPER: I will note, for the 5 6 record, there was no response from the Zoom. 7 Next we'll move on to Practical 8 Nursing Educational report. Dr. Burks. 9 DR. BURKS: Good morning, Madam 10 President. I have an update from the Practical Nursing Program. The accreditation site visits 11 12 for the Practical Nursing Programs under the 13 jurisdiction of the Mississippi Board of Nursing 14 are planned to start June 2024. This will be the first undertaking since the transition from 15 16 the community college board. 17 Copiah-Lincoln Community College will 18 be the first site visited. And a list of the programs and their contact information and their 19 20 accreditation status is in the report that was 21 provided to the members. 22 Workshops will also be offered in the fall of 2023 to review the standards, criteria, 23 24 and necessary materials. The program 25 administrators and faculty that serves as peer

- 1 site assessors, they will receive additional
- 2 training prior to the site visits.
- 3 Also the PN curriculum revisions are
- 4 underway. That is being facilitated by the
- 5 Mississippi Community College Board. They
- 6 intend to have another meeting for modifications
- 7 in the fall. They did not have any meetings
- 8 during the summer, so that -- once that date is
- 9 given, we will share that date. The curriculum
- 10 revision team consists of pretty much everyone.
- 11 It consists of faculty, program administrators,
- 12 business and industry. The revisions cannot go
- 13 forward without that input from business and
- 14 industry. So, again, once we have those dates,
- 15 we will share that information so everyone can
- 16 be involved in that process.
- 17 And finally, the annual report.
- 18 They're done in collaboration with NCSBN. The
- 19 report is required of all the practical nursing
- 20 programs in the State of Mississippi. And what
- 21 this report does is it looks at their admission,
- 22 retention criteria, the data, their ratios,
- 23 NCLEX pass rates for all test takers and those
- 24 who repeat.
- 25 This report is due October the 15th.

- 1 However, the portal for inputting that
- 2 information will be opening soon, and that
- 3 information, again, it goes out to the schools.
- 4 And once we receive that information, that
- 5 report will be shared with the board of
- 6 directors.
- 7 That is the end of my update. If
- 8 there are any questions, I will gladly answer
- 9 them at this time.
- 10 MS. CULPEPPER: Okay. Thank you,
- 11 Dr. Burks. Does anyone have any questions for
- 12 Dr. Burks?
- 13 (No verbal response.)
- 14 MS. CULPEPPER: Okay. At this time,
- 15 I would like to ask -- is there a motion on the
- 16 floor to accept Dr. Burks' report?
- 17 MR. CUMMINS: I'll make a motion to
- 18 accept.
- MS. GENTRY: I'll second.
- MS. CULPEPPER: At this time, any
- 21 discussion?
- 22 (No verbal response.)
- MS. CULPEPPER: All that accept,
- 24 please say aye.

     don't have a lot to report, but I do have some
23

     information that I need to pass on.
25
                The NCSBN annual meeting, all
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- 1 participants have been confirmed for the
- 2 meeting. The 45th anniversary of NCSBN will be
- 3 celebrated during this time. The theme is Shine
- 4 Through: Shaping a Brilliant Future. The color
- 5 theme is sapphire blue.
- 6 So in addition to delegate assembly,
- 7 presentations will be conducted that include the
- 8 World Health Organization regulatory guidelines,
- 9 AI and remote proctoring, the 2022 National
- 10 Workforce Study, and the impact of COVID-19 on
- 11 prelicensure nursing students.
- 12 An awards dinner and ceremony will be
- 13 held on Thursday night at the Hyatt Regency
- 14 Chicago, so wear your sapphire blue cocktail
- 15 attire to celebrate the sapphire anniversary.
- 16 The Covid-19 mandated vaccination
- 17 policy to attend in-person NCSBN events has been
- 18 lifted. Masks are no longer mandated, but left
- 19 to personal preference.
- 20 Operational Nightingale is the other
- 21 issue I would like to report on. There is no
- 22 new information to report from the Mississippi
- 23 Board of Nursing standpoint. The investigation
- 24 is ongoing with evidence of new schools being
- 25 investigated almost daily. As for Mississippi,

- 1 only four licensees have been identified in the
- 2 investigation thus far and have been cleared to
- 3 have received their initial nursing license
- 4 appropriately.
- 5 FARB is the Federation of
- 6 Associations of Regulatory Boards. That's my
- 7 third thing that I want to talk about. FARB is
- 8 a very good organization and they present some
- 9 very good conferences and educational
- 10 opportunities for staff.
- 11 So the 2024 Forum on Professional
- 12 Regulation Conference will be held January 25th
- 13 through the 27th, 2024, in Fort Worth, Texas at
- 14 the Omni Fort Worth. The FARB Forum on
- 15 Professional Regulation is a vibrant educational
- 16 and networking venue where those who are
- 17 involved with or interact with state
- 18 professional licensing boards can gain traction
- 19 on emerging trends, acquire insight on best
- 20 practices, stay ahead of new legislation, and
- 21 learn from each other through engaging
- 22 presentations. The agenda is forthcoming. And
- 23 once I receive that agenda, I will send it out
- 24 to the board members. This is a good
- 25 conference. It's somewhat of an expensive

- 1 conference, but it's a great conference. So if
- 2 you're interested in attending, please mark your
- 3 calendar January 25th through 27th, and then let
- 4 me and/or Ms. Vanessa Gray know of your
- 5 interest.
- 6 Board visibility. I won't belabor
- 7 that. You have that in the document before you.
- 8 As always, the board has been very visible in
- 9 the community and out and about with our
- 10 stakeholders. Right now Ms. Shan Montgomery and
- 11 Dr. Priscilla Burks are attending the FARB 2023
- 12 Innovation in Regulation Conference in
- 13 Alexandria, Virginia. They were gracious enough
- 14 to join us via Zoom because they were committed
- 15 to being at the business meeting. So we applaud
- 16 them for that.
- 17 The Innovation in Regulation
- 18 Conference is the premiere conference offered by
- 19 FARB for CEOs and staff leaders of national
- 20 regulatory associations around the country.
- 21 Conference topics are thoughtfully identified
- 22 and sessions are carefully designed with leading
- 23 industry partners to promote innovative
- 24 solutions to challenges facing the regulatory
- 25 community. Some of those presentations

- 1 included: Strategic Partnerships and
- 2 revolutionizing licensing, Digital
- 3 Transformation and Sustained Relevancy-The Real
- 4 Innovation, Security and Detecting Exam Fraud,
- 5 and Digital Credentials and Modernizing the
- 6 Regulatory Data Plumbing.
- 7 So very significant information.
- 8 You've always been a very proactive board. We
- 9 have proactive staff. So hopefully they'll
- 10 bring back some great information about what's
- 11 coming in the near future and how we can be a
- 12 part of that particular innovative strategy.
- Most importantly, I do want to
- 14 recognize a few individuals. Sheron Russell is
- 15 a staff member here. Sheron has served on the
- 16 NCLEX Item Review Subcommittee for NCSBN, and on
- 17 last week, the NCSBN board of directors
- 18 reappointed Ms. Sheron Russell, who is in our
- 19 MnVP compliance program, one of the individuals
- 20 that is in that particular area and is
- 21 responsible for the compliance of those
- 22 licensees that are in the MnVP program. And she
- was reappointed to the NCLEX item review
- 24 subcommittee. So we just want to congratulate
- 25 her on that. Reappointment, again, is a

- 1 testament to the leadership of you, as board
- 2 members, and allowing our staff to participate
- 3 in those types of activities.
- 4 Additionally -- and I'm elated at
- 5 this appointment -- one of our very own and one
- of your board members, Mr. Jeremy Cummins, has
- 7 been appointed to the NCSBN finance committee.
- 8 Mr. Cummins will serve a two-year term that will
- 9 begin immediately after the annual meeting in
- 10 August of 2023. I am elated that we have
- 11 someone of that magnitude to serve on this most
- 12 important committee. So I would just like for
- 13 you to join me in congratulating him on that.
- So the charge of that committee, if
- 15 you don't know, is to maintain a strong
- 16 financial position that allows the NCSBN
- 17 organization to enhance quality, introduce new
- 18 program elements, and grow without compromising
- 19 or jeopardizing core program delivery to nursing
- 20 regulatory bodies. This is not only national;
- 21 this is global. So that is so impactful to have
- 22 a member from the Mississippi Board of Nursing
- 23 serve at this level with the NCSBN finance
- 24 committee.
- Thank you, Jeremy, for stepping up to

- 1 the plate. When I send out that call for people
- 2 to volunteer for some of these committees, if
- 3 you're interested, let me know. He stepped out
- 4 on faith, and he was selected. Little did I
- 5 know did he think he was going to be selected.
- 6 But the charge now begins. It is such a
- 7 momentous occasion to have someone serve at that
- 8 level on this most important committee at the
- 9 national level. So, thank you.
- 10 Madam President, that's all I have.

- 13 to both of them. It will be a great experience

- 22 Right now we're looking at three --
- 23 interesting, once a year, we kind of hit this
- level, but we're looking at three different
- 25 fiscal years: Finishing up fiscal year '23,

- 1 beginning fiscal year '24, and preparing for
- 2 fiscal year '25. So we're kind of in a
- 3 precarious place here. Fiscal year '23 finished
- 4 up. We lack a few invoices having -- being able
- 5 to close the books and checking out on fiscal
- 6 year '23. It appears that we will be able to
- 7 start July 1st of this year in fiscal year '24
- 8 with a balance of \$7,715,567. Our fiscal year
- 9 '24 budget is 5.2 million. So you can see that
- 10 we do have some excess funds there that will
- 11 help us as we carry over.
- 12 We'll be going into -- and don't get
- 13 confused. I explained this to the committee
- 14 this morning. We work on fiscal years with our
- 15 budgeting, but we work on calendar years for our
- 16 revenue because that's how our renewals work.
- 17 So the end of calendar year '23, we'll have LPN
- 18 renewals, which are about 60 percent less in
- 19 revenue than RN renewal year. So we will need
- 20 the excess monies to help carry us through.
- 21 Once we close out the renewal period for LPNs,
- 22 we'll have a little bit better grasp of what
- 23 kind of overage we have and where we might can
- 24 allocate some additional monies should we need
- 25 to.

All the equipment and related items 1 2 purchased under the federal distance learning grant have been delivered to the schools. 3 are in the process of getting an inventory of 4 5 the items that have been placed in the schools. 6 The only remaining expense under this grant will 7 be some installation services, and to date, we 8 have spent 684,288. We have about another 9 112,000 to spend in installation services bringing this to a total of around 800,000. 10 initial grant was granted at 968,000 and some 11 12 change. We've expended less than that because 13 there were two schools that backed out from the 14 allocation from the grant, and that being Hinds Community College and Meridian Community 15 College. So once all the funds have been 16 expended, then we'll do a drawdown from the USDA 17 18 grant and pay off all of the equipment. As far as fiscal year '24 goes, we 19 20 got started in that. I gave you the balance 21 that we entered that with. We are still working 22 to fill several key vacant positions. personnel board had a few things that kind of 23 had us hung up over the last fiscal year. 24 25 Everything has been cleared out. We currently

- 1 have a full-time court reporter position, a
- 2 full-time HR position, and three full-time
- 3 investigator positions to be filled. And I
- 4 believe Dr. Johnson told us this morning they
- 5 will be underway trying to get all those
- 6 positions filled as soon as possible. We do --
- 7 those are all budgeted positions. So they would
- 8 fall within our budget.
- 9 Preparing for fiscal year '25, fiscal
- 10 year '25 legislative budget request is due on
- 11 August 1st. It's still not too late if there's
- 12 anything that you would like for us to add into
- 13 that budget. You can contact myself or Shan
- 14 Montgomery with those requests, and we'll be
- 15 happy to work that in as we can. The current
- 16 plan is to request a restoration of the amounts
- 17 reduced from the salary line items to fill the
- 18 vacant positions. If you recall, in fiscal year
- 19 '23, we had two part-time positions that were
- 20 dissolved due to inability to fill those. So
- 21 we'll be trying to get those monies back for
- 22 future positions.
- Next -- and this is somewhat
- 24 redundant because we ask for it year after year,
- 25 but we've got to do that to get our traction we

- 1 need. We're requesting a 10 percent salary
- 2 increase for all nursing positions. If you'll
- 3 recall a few months back, we discussed how
- 4 incredibly low the nursing positions are within
- 5 the agency. We're also requesting an average of
- 6 a 4 percent increase for non-nursing positions,
- 7 and this will be rewarded to employees that
- 8 obtain education and training on their duties
- 9 and also exhibit excellent performance.
- 10 And then lastly, the request includes
- 11 replacing two vehicles in fiscal year '25. None
- were replaced in fiscal year '23, and there's
- only funding for one car to be replaced in
- 14 fiscal year '24, and the majority of the
- 15 vehicles that the board of nursing have have in
- 16 excess of 100,000 miles. So it's time for us to
- 17 get moving on that.
- Our request for fiscal year '25 will
- 19 be \$5,562,992. This will show a 9.86 percent
- 20 increase in our current budget. But the board
- of nursing currently has ample funds to support
- 22 such budget requests.
- 23 That's all I have for our report. If
- 24 anyone has questions, I'll be happy to entertain
- 25 them.

- DR. STEWART: I just have a quick
- 2 question about the vehicles. So wasn't there an
- 3 issue in, like, the recent years about supply
- 4 and that was why we didn't get them?
- 5 MR. CUMMINS: That's right.
- DR. STEWART: So we think that's
- 7 resolved or...
- 8 MR. CUMMINS: We're in hopes.
- 9 Dr. Johnson, do you have any thoughts or ideas
- 10 on that? I haven't got anything. There was a
- 11 supply issue by all means. I know in fiscal
- 12 year '22 we had allocation for one and could not
- 13 get it.
- DR. JOHNSON: Yeah.
- MS. MONTGOMERY: Hey, guys. This is
- 16 Shan. That is correct. There is a supply
- 17 shortage of vehicles. We still don't know, but
- 18 we hope they're going to be able to supply us
- 19 this year; however, we still asked for it in the
- 20 budget in the event that we are able to purchase
- 21 those vehicles.
- 22 Again, it's hit and miss. We don't
- 23 know. We are on the list. The state only has
- 24 one vendor that they allow us to buy the
- 25 vehicles from. So we are on the list to

purchase a vehicle in the event that it comes 1 2 up. 3 MR. CUMMINS: Thank you. 4 MS. MONTGOMERY: You're welcome. 5 Thank you. 6 MS. CULPEPPER: Any other discussion? 7 So would someone like to make the motion to 8 accept the finance report? 9 MR. CUMMINS: I'll bring this out --10 this analysis as a form of a motion. 11 MS. CULPEPPER: Do I have a second? 12 MS. NORRIS-JOHNSON: I'll second. 13 MS. CULPEPPER: All those that accept, say aye. 14 15 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 16 MS. CULPEPPER: All right.
